
HOW TO GIVE YOUR TROMBONE A BATH

- 1. Fill a bath tub or a long plastic bin (about 4 feet long) with about 4 inches of warm (not hot) water and some dish soap (just one big squirt is enough).
 - a. If the water is too hot, the coating on the trombone will come off!
- 2. Take the Inner Slide all the way out of the Outer Slide, and lay both pieces in the warm soapy water.
 - a. Be careful not to scratch or dent them, or else your slide will become difficult to move.
- 3. Pull the Tuning Slide (see picture to right) off of the Bell Section, and lay both pieces in the soapy water.
 - a. If the Tuning Slide is stuck on, you can leave it on while it is soaking do not try to pull too

hard or you may bend or break the trombone.



- 4. Carefully lay the mouthpiece in the warm soapy water, and let all of the pieces soak for 15 minutes.
- 5. After 15 minutes, use a mouthpiece brush to scrub the inside of your mouthpiece.
- 6. Use a trombone snake (a brush on a long wire) to scrub the insides of the inner and outer slides, as well as inside of the tuning slide, and the bell section tubes.
 - a. Remember to be super careful not to scratch or dent the slides!
 - b. Don't try to force the snake around the bend in the outer slide it will get stuck!
- 7. Rinse everything thoroughly to get rid of any soap.
- 8. Lay all of the parts out on a soft towel for several hours so they can drain and drip-dry.
- 9. Once everything is dry, you can reassemble your trombone, **put a few drops of slide/valve oil on your inner slide**, move your slide back and forth a few times to distribute the slide oil, put a tiny bit of slide grease on the tuning slide so it doesn't get stuck in the future, and put the trombone back in its case!
